For us here at Whitefriars we celebrated with a large number gathering at the College Chapel for our annual Mother and Son Mass.

The College will further celebrate this important Feast day later in the term, when the weather will hopefully be a lot kinder for the many activities and celebrations that are planned.

The Carmelite devotion to Mary is seen as a way for us to get to know Christ better. The richness of knowing the Mother allows us to get to know the Son. This recent article I wrote takes up this theme.

At a recent KAIROS Retreat for the Year 11 students, past College Captain, Jonathon Deller (Class of 2012), gave a talk to the retreatants and in his presentation he used a quote he had borrowed from Mark Bolton, senior coach of the Carlton Football Club. Bolton challenged his new coaching team at the start of the season with:

'No one knows us as Carlton people... there is a difference between "I work at Carlton and I am Carlton."

Jonathon rephrased the statement for the students: *'...there is a difference between "I attend Whitefriars or I AM Whitefriars."* The look of approval of the latter was very much evident on the student faces.

So, what does "I AM Whitefriars" mean?

Any attempt to try and articulate what "I AM Whitefriars" means is always going to come up short. For starters, it doesn't mean it's a title solely owned by the present students of the College. It is a statement that anyone who has been connected with the College can claim ownership of. Why? To "be Whitefriars" refers to more than buildings and beautiful surroundings, it is a belief, a faith statement, a purpose and way of life. It lives in the centre of our being, and speaks of who we are as a people.

Principal's report - continued

The late Fr. Noel Kierce O.Carm, always insisted that the most important gift we can offer the students (past and present), staff and families of our College, is to be able to find the presence of God in each person. In some cases a tough assignment, but if we are truly committed to embracing and to living out our Carmelite Charism of Prayer, Community and Action, then welcoming and celebrating the presence of God in each member of our community is what St Paul writes about when he says; "...in belonging to each other, we belong to Christ." (2Cor10:7)

The Carmelite tenet of Contemplation (Prayer) means to contemplate the face of Jesus, the humanity of Jesus and the flesh of Jesus. Contemplation is the depth of prayer that doesn't mean you have to leave the flesh behind in order to discover divinity. Nor do you have to leave the humanity behind to discover God. To contemplate the face of Jesus is to contemplate the humanity of Jesus and the flesh of Jesus and to discover that he is not totally distant and removed from us, but is a God who is always and only in the flesh.

Our God is the flesh of human experience; of human events, the mess, the sweat, blood and tears, that's where God is to be found, in each person.

Our challenge is to discover at the heart of those we meet, the extraordinary presence of Jesus by learning Christ from Mary.

Who better can teach us more about Christ than the one who knows him best? Mary can help us to discover God's ways, to understand his message and to bring to Christ with Mary our humanity, our lives. Mary shared her life from the moment the child stirred in her womb right through to the bitter end. She becomes more and more like the one whom she bore and the same is the call to all of us. In other words, Mary moulds us, shapes us as she did Jesus. That's what is meant by contemplating Christ with her. Simply, it is wanting and finding the presence of God in each other.

On a final but sad note we ask that you keep James Barclay Year 9L and his family in your thoughts and prayers after the recent loss of his grandfather. May the Lord welcome him into His keeping.

Subject Selection

Year 10 Senior Pathways Parent Information Evening – Wednesday 20 July, McPhee Gym, 6.30pm

On Wednesday 20 July, the College will host a Senior Pathways Information Evening for Year 10 parents. This is an important evening to receive pathway information about the VCE, VET and VCAL programs and subject selection information.

The information provided during the evening will include careers, pathways and specific Learning Area details that will help students and parents make informed decisions about his future pathway based on his strengths, interests, further study options, possible career choices and future aspirations.

Subject selection forms for each family will be provided during the evening.

Year 9 Parent Information Evening – Wednesday 3 August, Theatre, 7pm

On Wednesday 3 August, the College will provide Year 9 parents with information pertaining to their son's subject selection. In 2017, the College is implementing the Victorian Curriculum F-10 so there is significant changes for students entering into Year 10. In responding to student, parent and staff feedback from the recent CIS surveys, the new curriculum will provide greater student choice of subjects at Year 10.

The information provided during the evening will include subject information, the renewed process for making subject selections, and possible opportunities moving into the Senior Years.

Subject selection forms for each family will be provided during the evening.

The Middle Years and Senior Years Curriculum Handbooks that contain important subject and pathway information will be available next week for all students in Years 7-11.

What our children really need to learn - Confidence

In engaging with our Learning @ Whitefriars document, students are encouraged to develop dispositions to reflect critically; to be open to feedback and develop a growth mindset; to take risks, experiment, practise and persevere; and be to responsible for their learning.

Guy Claxton and Bill Lucas, in their book *Educating Ruby – what our children really need to learn?* highlights how parents can support their son in developing these dispositions for learning as well as confidence.



Being confident involves developing and using a growth mindset, being a can-do person and being able to act independently. A growth mindset is founded on self-belief. Children who believe they can get better at things, it turns out, normally can – with practice and determination. The fixed mindset makes you fatalistic, so you don't think it is worth doing the very things – practising and struggling – that could help you to improve. The best ways in which you can encourage your child to develop this kind of self-belief is to avoid too much generalised praise (Well done, Guy) or 'ability' praise (Guy, you're just a natural at this), and concentrate instead of giving really specific feedback to your child when he does things well (I really liked the way you spent extra time on your homework, Guy, and used the ideas your teacher had given you for writing interesting sentences). Guy, in this final example, is hearing that his effort paid off and, over time, he will see how valuable it is to go the extra mile.

Another important job for parents and family members is to share things with which they are struggling. In this way, children learn that struggling and making mistakes are normal and healthy aspects of learning.

A real can-do confidence comes from experiences of planning and seeing difficult tasks through. A key part of such success involves the ability to set goals and then plan how you will achieve them. Homework provides a good opportunity to help your child break a task down into smaller components, think through how long each part might take, make a plan, do it and then, whenever possible, talk about how it went.

A good read to help understand more about developing confidence is Carol Dweck's *Mindset*.

FOCUS ON OPEN DAYS: Each year in August and September, vocational and tertiary institutions open their doors to the public to showcase the amazing features they have to offer, including courses, scholarships, student services, facilities, and accommodation etc. Open days are exciting with lots of activities going on including live bands, BBQs, competitions, information sessions, art displays and drama performances. If you are considering studying a vocational (e.g., TAFE) or higher education (e.g., university) course after school, it is essential that you attend open days, as you will be able to:

Get a feel for the culture of the campus
Learn about courses and career options
Undertake campus and accommodation tours led by current students
Speak directly to students and lecturers about the courses or careers you are interested in
Compare the course areas you are interested in at different institutions
Learn about student sports and societies you can join and be active in
Get course counselling and guidance
Attend information sessions and workshops
Watch live demonstrations
Listen to bands, eat lots of food, participate in activities and have fun!

Further, attending open days will prepare you for courses you may apply for that require you to undertake an interview as part of the selection process. By now you should have identified institutions you would like to visit, found out their open day dates and downloaded their open day programs. Once you have the programs, make a list of the information sessions you would like to attend. If you have time, try and attend information sessions on topics like pathways, VTAC, scholarships, accommodation and overseas exchange programs. If you are unsure what to ask on the day, Victoria University has developed some questions you can ask:

Are there any prerequisite subjects I need to study for this course?
What study scores/ATAR do I need to achieve to get into this course?
Do I need to attend an audition, have an interview or present a folio as part of the selection process?
Are there any other ways into this course other than through a VTAC application?
Can I do a vocational course first which might then lead into a university course?
What is the difference between TAFE and university study?
If I can't get into this course, is there a similar course at this institution I can apply for?
What are the core subjects for this course and are there any electives?
How many hours per week are spent in class and can I study part time?
Can I defer the course?
What kind of jobs do graduates of this course generally get?
Are there any scholarships available?

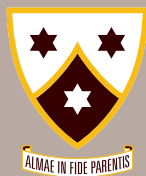

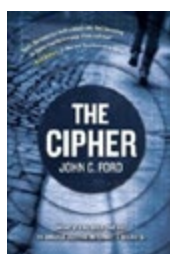

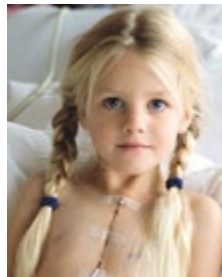

"Thank you to all of you for your support to our College sporting program again this year. We are very fortunate as a College to have so many talented sportsman and students willing to dedicate time to making our sporting program enjoyable and a success.

Being the start of term 3, I just wanted to remind you all of a couple of things regarding our College sporting program and your participation.

- It is an expectation that students at our College display their god given sporting talents not only outside of the school community, but within 'OUR' school community. Consequently, if you are given the privilege of being selected in a Whitefriars ACC sporting side it is an expectation that you honor that commitment; and for the 'entire' season.
- Any student wanting to be given an exemption for playing in a particular team that they have been chosen for, or on a particular week of a term; needs to do so by going through myself as the first point of contact (Head of Sport), or Mr Brad Bird as the second point of contact (Deputy of Students). These requests are not to go to the individual coaches as they do not need this pressure put on them.
- Exemptions for ACC sport will not be considered on the basis of: students scheduling employment during ACC competition times, outside sport training commitments (unless State or National), tutoring, re-sacs, or extra classes. The College provides more than enough
